Twenty years later Vice President Shaunagh Brown is competing for England in the Womens rugby World Cup Final. Back in 1869, on the 23rd of October, a small group of blokes met for a run at the Kings Arms, Peckham Rye...the rest is History.

Dipping into the Club History, it reveals that the proposer of the adoption of the entwined squares insignia in 1878 was a John Metcalf. His wife Charlotte was an honorary member of Peckham AAC and they would be great supporters of the Club and its activities until they passed away after the Second World War. They received a telegram from the King when they celebrated their Diamond Wedding Anniversary in 1936. It could have all been so different. In the 1880s they were passengers on the SS Cheerful which was involved in a collision with HMS Hecia. The Cheerful was split in two and Mrs Metcalfe was the only female survivor. One report says that she was saved because she wrapped her fur coat around her when she got into the water and it spread out and kept her afloat. John Metcalf died in 1946 at the age of 94 and he put his longevity down to his active interest in Athletics. He was still walking five miles a day in his 80s and was still doing the shopping until shortly before his passing. The winner of the Senior Mens 1500 metres at the Kent Championships receives the J Metcalf Cup, a trophy that was presented to the County Association by Blackheath Harriers at the time of its formation.

Perhaps his genes also helped him live such a long life as he was a descendent of "Blind" John Metcalf, the road engineer of the eighteenth century, an extraordinary character, who also died in his 90s. Key his name into a search engine of your choice and read about his exploits, surely ideal material for a television period drama.

Blind at the age of six after smallpox, he learnt the fiddle as a way of making money but also managed to ride and hunt. He also acted as a tour guide and had a 10 guinea bet with a Colonel Liddell that he could walk from London to Harrogate quicker than Liddell could travel by coach. Metcalf finished each stage of the journey before Liddell, the Colonel's coach struggling with the terrain. Metcalf would go on to build many roads in the North of England. The A658 Harrogate Southern Bypass is known as the John Metcalf Way.

125 years ago in October 1897,



100 years ago in October 1922,

The AGM takes place on the 21st at the Railway Hotel.

On Monday 30th there is a Bohemian Concert at the Hotel Victoria, Northumberland Avenue



75 years ago in October 1947.

The Club 5 is incorporated in match against Surrey AC. Seventy Club members take part as well as 18 from Surrey AC. Winner is H N Nunns.

At the AGM Sydney Wooderson introduces his successor G H Wilkinson.

50 years ago in October 1972

Bob Richardson wins the Club 5 from Chris Haines with Peter Horwood third. Douglas Tingey wins the handicap. Blackheath beat London University in a Mob Match at Parliament Hill with scoring 28 a side. First home is Bob Richardson. Wigmore Ladies officials confirmed at the GM are President – George Stratford, Secretary and Treasurer – Daphne Reed, Captain – Miss Nicola Klarkowski.

25 years ago in October 1997

It is a memorable month for Dave Taylor. He is the first Briton home at the World Half Marathon Championships at Kosice, Slovakia. He times 63.24. He goes through 5km in 14.35, 10k in 29.26 and 15k in 44.30 before starting to tire. Mark Steinle does not run as he had hoped finishing in 87th place in 65.36. Dave follows this performance by breaking the Club Marathon record at Frankfurt at the end of the month. His time of 2.13.27 takes over two minutes off the previous record of Bill Foster (2.15.49) set in 1995. Also on the roads Darrell Smith wins the Tonbridge 10 in 50.03 and Gareth Griffin becomes the youngest ever person to complete the London to Brighton race. At the age of 18 he times 8.38.15 but that is just part of the story...

London to Brighton,

Sunday 5th October 1997

Sunday, 5th October was another special day in the history of the Club. The first London to Brighton took place in 1951 and this was the 47th running of the event. It starts at 7am on Westminster Bridge and yet at 6.45 you wouldn't believe that anything was about to happen; you wonder if you're in the right place. The field of 120 then appear from nowhere and on the first stroke of 7 from Big Ben, they're off.

Our team is numbered 1 to 6; it includes John E Turner who does it every year, Colin Poole who is starting for the third time and Alan Jones for the 2nd. Trevor Wood, Gareth Griffin and Brian Smith are all virgins. JET has always wanted to be part of a Blackheath team. Will this be the year? During 1997 the age range for our Southern League Division 7 team was 16 to 65. For the London to Brighton it was 18 to 60? Who said there is a generation gap?

It was Blackheath at it's best. The number of supporters was superb. You kept on being surprised at the frequency of bumping into people you didn't expect to see. The support was tremendous and it made you proud to be a Blackheath Harrier.

Four finished with Trevor Wood leading us home in 8 hours 26 mins. Gareth came in 12 minutes later just two minutes ahead of JET. Over an hour later Brian Smith came home in 9 hours 44 mins. With 4 to score, we finished a team for the first time for many years. They were rewarded with SEAA Championship medals as the event had hosted the 1997 SEAA Ultra Distance Championship.

It was a remarkable achievement. Trevor always had a smile when you greeted him, but you could see it hurt when he didn't think anyone was around. JET always finishes and always seemed to be enjoying himself. Brian Smith was apparently very underprepared but was totally

laid-back and relaxed throughout the whole journey.

Sally Gunnell was at the finish to welcome the first three and present them with their awards, but she really missed the main story which was reported in Athletics Weekly. The previous week we had celebrated the success of our juniors in the European Juniors Club Cup. This week we celebrated another remarkable achievement by a junior member of the Club.

18 months previously Gareth Griffin had cancer and was undergoing treatment, including Radiotherapy at St Thomas' Hospital, so you can imagine his thoughts as he passed that Hospital immediately after the start of the race. The treatment was successful, the results showing that he has fully recovered his health. He ran to prove how well he was, he ran in an attempt to beat his Dad's best time of 8 hours 42 mins and he ran to raise money for the Macmillan Cancer Appeal. How brilliantly he performed. At the top of Ditchling Beacon he had 57 minutes to do the last 6 miles and his Dad said "Its all down to pride now". He made it with 4 minutes to spare.

I was there and it was a privilege to share such a moment.

At the main presentation Gareth was presented with a cut-glass tankard, a gift from St Thomas' Hospital. On it is inscribed 'Gareth Griffin, what an Inspiration'. After his story was told he was given a standing ovation with not many dry eyes in the house. He had rightly worn Number 1 in the race. He was duly acclaimed the following Wednesday at the Club where he deservedly received his second standing ovation.

Our Club History and our Gazettes tell us that we won the individual and team awards in the first two London to Brighton races. Lew Piper and Derek Reynolds may have run faster over the old shorter and flatter course but they would certainly be very proud of their 1997 successors as should we all.

The British Athletics Federation (BAF) go into administration. The Club is a creditor owed £2350 for an agreed contribution to expenses for the European Champion Clubs Cup for Juniors in Zagreb. The Courier comments "While one may not envy the task taken on by David Moorcroft, the ordinary club runner who pays all his own race entry fees, his travel and accommodation, buys his own kit and pays the Physio, is unlikely to waste much sympathy over the past policies which have landed the BAF in it".
