

Our Centenary Cross Country event was badly hit by the weather, only 61 runners starting. Orion and Ranelagh could not complete teams because of the chaotic road conditions after the heavy snow; while the Oxford-Cambridge runners present were absorbed by other teams. Our continental visitors were not affected by the road conditions, but it was only by the lucky chance of Harold Thompson being in Paris on business the previous week that he could persuade Stade Francais to travel! The start was delayed thirty minutes (deliberately!) to give runners and others a chance to arrive, and luckily this meant the snow stopped before the race, but few spectators braved the elements. Bob Richardson kept us warm with a fine run second to Dai Francis most of the way, then Bob Holt went into the lead but our Bob "nosed" ahead and just stayed there for the last couple of hundred agonising yards; the rest of the team performed to their best, and thus took second to the E.C.C.U. Despite the empty places at the supper afterwards, due to the wretched weather, everyone there felt the meal and presentations a great success. Some details of the race are:-

The other Centenary event — or should it be non-non-event? I blush! — was the rugby match with Park House on Boxing Day when our team proved too strong and too fit, not to mention too numerous, for the Park House team which visibly grew in strength as the match progressed, and so we celebrated another Centenary victory.

In the Kent Championships our Boys won, with C. Wright first home 4th; our Seniors and Youths were each second, the seniors one point behind Cambridge Harriers while A. Dunnett was 1st in the youths race and Goodwin 4th; the Juniors were third, I. McIntyre first home 7th. The County team for the Inter-County race will include Ian Wilson (4th), Peter Horwood (7th) and Bob Richardson who missed the County race as he was still in Brazil after his 12th place in the Sao Paulo "Round the Houses" race. In December the club "Junior 5" was won by M. Athawes, the "Youth 3½" by A. Dunnett and the "Boys 3½" by C. Wright from nine others.

We also have since Newsheet Seven, Bob Richardson winning the G.L.C. Championships with the team but twelve points behind the winners, yet fourth! We had good numbers at Aylesford (Kent League) and at Crawley; the best of our three teams at Aylesford was equal third, while at Crawley our teams, one of seniors and juniors the other of youths and boys, each won their races, Tony Dunnett winning the latter race by a very large interval. For the "Mob" Match at Chingford we had 22 starters, hardly more than at either of the above matches, but still outnumbered and beat Orion; it must be added that on this day we also had a team in the Brickwood "5" at Portsmouth, where we were second to Portsmouth and Pete Horwood was sixth. Our only rowing rivals this year were Ranelagh, and about 30 'heathens cheered our crew to victory.

COMING EVENTS.

At Petersham on 17th January and a week later in the club "10", almost certainly over the real country, there are runs for everyone; if you really cannot manage "10" there is also a "5" at Hayes against Sevenoaks School, while if you cannot get to Petersham support our Youth and Boys at Sparrows Den running in open races organised by Kent A.C. We hope many 'heathens will go to Halstead Place School on 31st January to run or watch and so encourage the lads at this school. Veterans remember your club championship on 14th February, and then on 21st February anyone over 18 is welcome to a "5" at Canterbury, same lap as the County Race, for the Kent League fixture. Both Southern and National are a week earlier than usual, the former on the 7th February at Parliament Hill, first race at 2.20 p.m., when our team deserves our full support. For the National at Blackpool on 28th February a special train leaves Euston at 7.50am returning there at 10.00pm., for a very reasonable £2. 10s., so if you can travel to watch the race, and only a couple of spectators in these Northern lands would be most welcome, please contact Chris Haines, Biggin Hill 4368, very soon.
